


The U.S. President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief

The U.S. President Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) was launched in 2003 by President George W. Bush to combat global HIV/AIDS. It is the largest commitment every by any nation for an international health initiatives dedicated to a single diseases. The U.S. Government committed nearly \$ 80 billion to bilateral HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria programs.

In Ethiopia, the PEPFAR funding is channeled through three US government agencies: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Department of Defense (DoD), and United States Agency for International Development (USAID). These three agencies collaborate with over 41 partners to implement the PEPFAR programs, partners such as the Government of Ethiopia, multilateral institutions such as UNAIDS, WHO and Global Fund, local civil society and faith-based organizations, people living with HIV, and many others to achieve common goals.

Over the last 15 years PEPFAR has invested nearly \$3 billion to support the HIV/AIDS response in Ethiopia. Since 2005 PEPFAR supported provision of lifesaving Antiretroviral Therapy (ART) for over 468,705 men, women and children which accounts for 98% of the treatment being offered nationally. PEPFAR provided voluntary medical male circumcision for 105,241 men, allowing more than 1 million pregnant women to receive HIV testing and counseling and 2million orphans, vulnerable children, and their caregivers to receive care and support in Ethiopia.
